PART 1 INTRODUCTION (10 MINUTES)

As a class, review your theme and list your theme elements in the front of the room on a poster or whiteboard.

Examples of theme elements are:

- Colors
- Fonts
- Graphics
- White spacePhoto treatments
- Verbal tie-ins

PART 2

EXTERNAL REVIEW (10 MINUTES)

- Now review three publications from Walsworth's <u>Theme Gallery</u> and list their theme elements.
- Identify how each of the publications successfully executed their theme from start to finish.

PART 3

INTERNAL REVIEW (20 MINUTES)

Launch Live Yearbook from your Yearbook 360 - Online Design account. As a class, review your pages from start to finish and make note of the theme elements visible throughout your book. Do these theme elements match your list in part 1?

Review what elements should be placed on the following spreads to help wrap up your theme:

- Index
- Colophon (find key components here).
- Closing Spread

As students prepare to complete their yearbook, they will work to keep unity through the last page by ensuring theme elements are present in their index, colophon and closing pages.

Opening: Pages in the yearbook that verbally explain the theme and the theme graphics



Closing: Page or pages at the end of the yearbook that verbally wraps up the book; contains theme elements



Colophon: Information placed at the back of the book containing facts about the production of the book



Index: A reference tool found at the back of a book containing an alphabetical listing of names with corresponding page numbers
